## In the Firehouse Gallery Front Gallery "Earth Day and Ocean Conservation" April 18 - May 27, 2018

Beginning April 18 and running through May 27, the Waimea Arts Council presents an art exhibition on Earth Day and Ocean Conservation at their Firehouse Gallery in Waimea. This special art and fine craft show is timed to coincide with Earth Day on April 22, and gives island artists an opportunity to promote ocean conservation through all mediums of art and fine craft, including photography and sculpture. It will feature endangered marine animals, such as sea turtles, monk seals, and humpback whales, as well as scenes showing the beauty of the ocean, both above and below the water.

Our ocean faces many threats, including coral bleaching, floating trash, overfishing and ocean acidification. "The ocean is at the center of who we are. Even if you've never seen the ocean, you're touched by it every single day. It produces half the air you and I breathe every day, the food we eat and the water we drink. You can't help but be inspired by the ocean. From majestic whales to jaw-dropping waves, colorful coral reefs to graceful sea turtles, the ocean can capture your heart and soul like nothing else on earth." ~Ocean Conservancy Website

What more appropriate place to honor the ocean than in Hawaii, where we are completely surrounded by water and most people rely on it for recreation and/or food. The sea turtles use our beaches to lay their eggs and the humpback whales visit us every winter and use our waters to give birth to the next generation. Since 2014, Kailua-Kona has had a dedicated monk seal hospital, Ke Kai Ola, where they care for sick and injured animals and prepare them to return to the wild.

To participate in the show, artists must be a current member of the Waimea Arts Council. New members are always welcome. Pieces are limited to a total of 36 x 36" combined dimensions and must be framed or gallery wrapped and ready to

hang. 3D works cannot exceed a total of 18 x 18 x 18" combined dimensions. Artwork entered must be original and produced by the artist. All works must be available for sale. No prints or reproductions will be accepted for this hanging in this show with the exception of digital art or photographic prints; however, matted prints and cards may be submitted for the racks.

The Firehouse Gallery is the most visible project of the Waimea Arts Council, an all-volunteer non-profit organization that sponsors programs, exhibits and education related to the arts. It is located in South Kohala's historic old fire station, at the crossroads of Mamalahoa Highway and Lindsey Rd. (Hwy. 19 and 190), across from the Waimea Shell Station. Exhibits change monthly. The gallery is open Wed.-Fri. and Sun., 11 am to 3 pm, and Sat., 10 am to 3 pm. There is plenty of free parking behind the gallery.

## The Powerful Influence of Climate Change on Coral Reefs

# Influenced by the 2017 film "Chasing Coral," local Big Island artist Josh Gerbert depicts the dramatic visual impact of coral bleaching on coral and the fishes therein.

Coral reefs are an essential part of the earth's ecosystem, serving as the nursery for all ocean life, most notably the beautiful, colorful array of reef fish, as well as lobsters, clams, seahorses, sponges, and sea turtles. Corals themselves are alive, and are in fact animals. Coral reefs support a quarter of all marine species, as well as half a billion people around the world. Fifty percent of the world's corals have died in the last 30 years; it is estimated that more than 90 percent of the world's coral reefs will die by 2050. Climate change in the form of higher-than-normal ocean temperatures has been shown to contribute to the majority of coral bleaching: when corals are stressed by changes in conditions such as temperature, light, or nutrients, they expel the symbiotic algae living in their tissues, causing them to turn completely white.

As coral reef habitats decrease due to bleaching, reef associated fish populations also decrease, which affects fishing opportunities. Hunger, poverty and political instability could result. This bleaching is a sign that our underwater rainforests of coral are under more stress and subject to mortality. As temperatures rise, mass coral bleaching events and infectious disease outbreaks are becoming more frequent. Additionally, carbon dioxide absorbed into the ocean from the atmosphere has already begun to reduce calcification rates in reef-building and reef-associated organisms by altering seawater chemistry through decreases in pH.

What can we do to help prevent coral bleaching? The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration suggests the following:

- 1. Conserve water: The less water you use, the less runoff and wastewater will pollute our oceans. Help reduce pollution: Walk, bike or ride the bus. Fossil fuel emissions from cars and industry increase ocean warming, which causes mass-bleaching of corals and can lead to widespread destruction of reefs.
- 2. Shrink your carbon footprint to reduce greenhouse gases.
- 3. Drive less.
- 4. Reduce, reuse, or recycle.
- 5. Purchase energy-efficient appliances and lightbulbs.
- 6. Print less. Download more. Use less water.
- 7. Do your part to help improve overall coral reef conditions.
- 8. Reduce the use of lawn and garden chemicals.
- 9. DO NOT dump household chemicals in storm drains.
- 10. Choose sustainable seafood. Visit www.FishWatch.com.
- 11. Learn about good reef etiquette and practice it when in the water.
- 12. Volunteer for beach and waterway clean ups.

Working out of her Kamuela studio, she creates fine art and functional craft from primarily paper, and glass while constitutional craft

"I am a combined media abstract artist that utilizes recycled materials in most of my work. I prefer to use recycled glass, paper, wood and metals out of respect for our finite environment. In the process of transforming mundane objects into things of beauty and meaning I'm captivated by the thrill and subtle twists of vision I am granted. I'm like an explorer on a path never before traveled where every new vista fills me with joy."

West holds a BFA in Design with concentration in structural fiber, aka weaving, from the University of Kansas. She went on to pursue a career in graphic arts which included owning a commercial printing company in Waimea. She has been involved with the Waimea Arts Council since she moved here 30 years ago.

**Susun Gallery** is an acrylic painter, teacher, hula dancer, snorkeler, nature lover and lover of all things Hawaiian. She opened Susun Gallery Artschool in Santa Cruz, CA in 1987, after a career as a sign painter in the San Jose area, and as a fine art consultant in Carmel. The school is home to hundreds of talented art students, all learning to draw, paint and sculpt their world, their way.

She now lives in Waimea and is learning and painting fine art again, as well as sharing her art knowledge with the Kona and Kohala communities She is the directing art teacher at Kahakai Elementary School in Kona, and orchestrates painting class events for corporations, schools and private groups.

Artschool on the Beach is her new studio, and a fun way for locals and visitors to explore painting with great results in a short time. "Experience paradise while creating a personal masterpiece in Hawaii. Come join me and let me introduce you to new art attitudes and altitudes. Explore every grain of sand, fill your paint cup from a waterfall, rub red dirt

# Update on Na 'Opio Youth Show



The 34th Annual Nā `Opio Youth Art Show and Competition was held February 28 - March 18. The show featured young artists from grades 6 through 12 from schools and home schooled students in the North and South Kohala and Hāmākua districts. Awards for 1st,2nd and 3rd place winners were

awarded to each grade level and presented at a reception held Sunday, March 4th at the Firehouse Gallery.

Here is information on the judges, which was not available at the time of the last newsletter, as well as a photo of the winners after receiving their awards.

Scott Yoell and Margo Ray were the judges for the show. Both are art professionals that live and work in Waimea and co-own Island Eclectic, an art handling and custom design business.

Scott Yoell is an artist engaging traditional and electronic media, originally from Windsor, Ontario. His recent work has been realized in drawing, sculpture, and video/sound installation. Yoell holds a BFA from the University of Windsor. Canada, and a MFA in Imaging and Digital Arts from the University of Maryland Baltimore County, USA. His work has been exhibited in The Contemporary Museum Biennial of Hawai'i Artists. The Hui No'eau Visual Arts Center, IDspace, Curtis Town Hawaii, Gallery Art Mûr, Montreal Quebec, and Artcite, Windsor Ontario and he currently has a solo exhibit at the Lancaster Museum of Art and History in Lancaster, California, It Takes a Village.

Margo Ray is a printmaker, painter and installation artist from the Big Island of Hawai'i. She holds an MFA from Concordia University in Montreal. Quebec and a BA in Studio Arts from University of Hawaii at Hilo. Her works have been exhibited in venues such as Second Street Gallery (Charlottesville, VA), The Contemporary Museum at First Hawaiian Center (Honolulu, HI) and The Parisian Laundry (Montreal,QC). Ray has held residencies in California and Canada; her artwork can be found in the collections of the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts, The Honolulu Museum of Art, and the Artist Book Collection of the Bibliotheque Nationale du Quebec.
