The Waimea Arts Council is pleased to announce a show celebrating the 50th anniversary of the Kawaihae Canoe Club. The show, titled "Hoe Wa'a" (Paddle Canoe) will run from June 1 - June 26, 2022, with special Talk Story Receptions on Sunday June 5 and Sunday June 26. These events will be a chance for community interaction with members of the canoe club, and a great oppertunity to hear some tales, tall and otherwise!

This show features work from 11 artists from the greater Hawaii Island Community, as well as work from 14 WAC members. With a large variety of media including wooden paddles, fiber art, fabric lei, silk painting, photography, and all venues of painting, this show has something for everyone. Kawaihae Canoe Club shirts will be for sale at the gallery. Other memorabila from the history of this esteemed paddling team will also be on display. These events are free and open to the public, and will adhere to any current Covid 19 guidelines from the State of Hawaii or County governance.

Call for Entries!



The Waimea Arts Council's Huaka'i show will run from July 1–August 28, 2022 at the Firehouse Gallery in Kamuela. The theme Huaka'i has a depth of meaning far beyond its literal translation of 'journey.' In Hawaii, a huaka'i is often a voyage with a purpose, a journey to gain a deeper understanding of oneself, one's culture, one's ancestors, one's soul. Artists are invited to travel on, with, and through their imaginations. Entries must be taken to the Firehouse Gallery between the hours of 11 am and 3pm on June 25 & June 26, 2022. The esteemed jurors are Stephen Freedman, a third-generation potter and sculptor, and Philippe F. Nault, a well-known abstract painter and interpreter of Hawaiian culture. The jurors will award cash prizes totaling \$1200. The Hawaii State Foundation for Culture and the Arts has been invited to the show to acquire works for the State Collection. The show is open to all Big Island artists 18 and older. Artists may enter a maximum of three pieces.
